Artistic Director's Note

Welcome to Season 2024, where we relish Shakespeare's highest achievements in the ridiculous and the sublime: A Midsummer Night's Dream and King Lear. In fact, both of these qualities are apparent within each of these magnificent plays. The amateur actors, or mechanicals, in A Midsummer Night's Dream are lovably ridiculous, while the faeries and their king and queen embody both ridiculous and sublime. In King Lear Shakespeare gives us the painfully ridiculous Poor Tom and the Fool, and then the sublime meeting of Edgar and Gloucester, and the heartbreaking reconciliation of Lear and Cordelia. All the plays exhibit an array of genres; Shakespeare's variety is unmatched. I particularly love the shifts of scale and focus within the plays, from domestic and familial to epic, and even abstract. In this season we present an early comedy and a mature tragedy, and then later in the year I will lead us through as many plays as Loan fit In A Nutshell.

A Midsummer Night's Dream is very special to me. We attempted to tour this production in 2021 and managed a handful of shows in the Northern Territory, Queensland and Tasmania before the borders closed around us. I am grateful so many of the actors have returned, and we get to fulfil this show's destiny. A Midsummer Night's Dream is so beautifully constructed, the characters so lovingly depicted, and the poetry so beautiful. It is about the imagination and the theatre; it is about pretending. The Dream has terrifically terrible behaviour and the madness that comes from being in love; it is romantic and life affirming. I can't help but think this was a favourite of Shakespeare's. If you come to one of our talks or catch me in the foyer, I will give you my theory on why I think that is. Our production doesn't hide from the darkness - all of Shakespeare's comedies travel through potential tragedy but the final act of A Midsummer Night's Dream may be the funniest and most wonderful finale he ever wrote.

Whether you are revisiting an old friend in this play or are brand new to Shakespeare, *A Midsummer Night's Dream* is a play to treasure.

If one were to describe the plot of King Lear it could sound like a fairytale or the set-up for a joke: three sisters - one good, two evil a controlling father, a fool, a storm. But in the hands of Shakespeare, the complexities and nuances of this great play create an astonishing portrait of a family and a country torn apart. All our assumptions are upended, our loyalties tested, the depth of our emotions revealed. As in the best of Shakespeare, we can find ourselves in the unlikeliest of characters and situations. Robert Menzies has been one of our great classical actors for four decades. His recent work for Bell Shakespeare has been a joy and I am thrilled to collaborate with Robert as he tackles one of the great roles in Western theatre.

And so, to the second volume of In A Nutshell, this time with a subtitle, The Poetry of Violence. The focus of this second iteration is on the various ways Shakespeare explores and defines violence. Yes, physical harm, cruelty, and plenty of delicious insults, but also the extremes of emotion, the intensity, hastiness and impetuosity of love in all its forms. I will again take an unashamedly personal journey through scenes and speeches I love in plays including Julius Caesar, The Merchant of Venice, Romeo and Juliet, Coriolanus, Richard III, Henry VI, Antony and Cleopatra, Timon of Athens, and Titus Andronicus, opening them up and giving insight into some of Shakespeare's obsessions, featuring performances by a group of our favourite actors.


Shakespeare's classic comedy, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, is reawakened in this breathless production brimming with magic, mirth and mayhem.

Love is in the air in Athens – and it's contagious. Besides the royal wedding, which is just days away, there are young lovers dreaming of enchanted futures together. Hermia and Lysander are besotted with one another, while Helena adores Demetrius. The only snag is that Demetrius loves Hermia – and he's got Hermia's father on his side. So nobody is happy. (Shakespeare wasn't kidding when he said the course of true love never did run smooth.)

Determined to be together, Hermia and Lysander meet in a moonlit forest with plans to elope. Following hot on their heels is Demetrius, who in turn is pursued by a lovelorn Helena. But the young lovers are not alone in the forest. Nick Bottom and his hapless bunch of tradies have gathered to rehearse a play to be performed at the royal wedding. And, hidden from human eyes, a mischievous sprinkling of faeries are also in the forest that night. The three worlds collide in an explosion of comic confusion that throws the future of all the lovers into jeopardy.

This production is quick as a shadow. Fast, funny and family-friendly, this is *A Midsummer Night*'s *Dream* reimagined.


